TorqAid – www.torgaid.com offers an accredited online Disaster Risk Management (DRM) program¹, which can be taken either as a self-paced study, and/or as a twelve week intensive. A total of **six** modules (ie Mods 1, 2, 3a, 3b, 4, 5) are offered. Students who wish to claim Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL) for accreditation purposes need to complete all of these modules plus the assignment². Individuals not interested in RPL, can choose any number of modules (ie from 1 to 5) to suit their professional needs. The *Intended Outcome* of the complete DRM program plus assignment is therefore:

To provide the required understanding and skills across the Disaster Risk Management Cycle to enable the humanitarian and development practitioner to better understand, prepare for, respond to, and recover from, a range of natural disasters and complex emergencies.

The six key DRM modules are outlined below.

- Module 1: Key Disaster Risk Management (DRM) Issues
- Module 2: The Disaster Risk Management Cycle (DRMC)
- Module 3a: The Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) diagram
- Module 3b: Risk Management
- **Module 4: Participatory Project Management (PPM)**
- Module 5: Complex Humanitarian Emergencies (CHEs)

Module 4: Participatory Project Management (PPM) ³

This module, by necessity, cannot cover all aspects of Participatory Project Management (PPM), as that would require a longer training period⁴. This module is therefore somewhat selective and focuses on the following:

- An introduction to Participatory Project Management (PPM) which includes:
 - ✓ The Project Management Cycle
 - ✓ Identifying community strengths and challenges
 - ✓ The Project Design Document (PDD)
- A selection of useful participatory techniques, particularly the Ten Seed Technique (TST) ranking tool, and the Seasonal Calendar
- The role of Shongjog⁵ (Communication with Communities = CwC) in Bangladesh, and particularly the role of the CwC Working Group in Cox's Bazar focussing on support

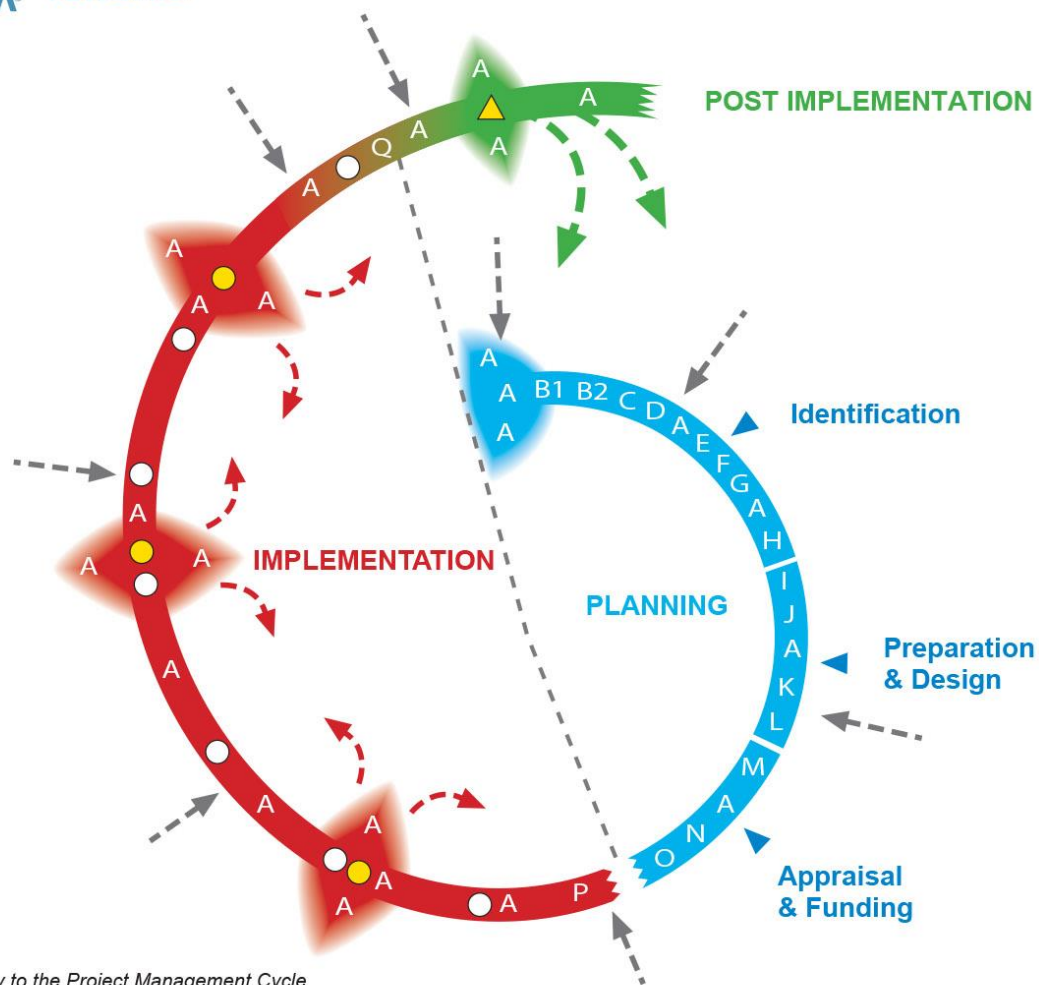
