The PDRM Outcome

The intended outcome of the online PDRM program is:

To provide knowledge and some skills to enable the online PDRM participant to both understand; and then later contribute to being more effective in planning for; implementing; and evaluating humanitarian initiatives across the Disaster Risk Management Cycle (DRMC).

Online Teaching Platform ²	<p>This is accessed on the TorqAid website, and this includes Learning Modules 1-5. Each module includes:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Introductions ○ A Blog ○ Tasks <p>The facilitator adds input to the Blog and Tasks, and participants are encouraged to dialogue with each other on the issues raised.</p>
Weekly Main & 'Drop-in' Zoom sessions	<p>There is a weekly main Zoom session held at 8pm every Wednesday (Melbourne time). This lasts for 1.25 hours. This is mainly a teaching session, although there is plenty of opportunity for the facilitator and participants to dialogue with each other. The topics covered in this 15 week Zoom teaching program are outlined on page 3 of this document.</p> <p>Complementary to this, is an optional 1 hour 'Drop-in' Zoom on Mondays at 8pm. This is an opportunity to cover specific topics in more detail, or for participants to raise specific questions.</p> <p>Recordings will be generally made of both the regular and 'drop-in' Zoom sessions³</p>
Extra Material	<p>Extra material will be released by the facilitator, either through email or the online blog. This consists of a combination of:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Useful articles relating to the PDRM curriculum ○ News items, or new publications, which are relevant to the PDRM

The Assessment Criteria

In order to claim advanced standing or accreditation towards programs offered by two Australian universities, PDRM participants are required to take all five modules, and complete three assignment questions. The details of this is outlined below - www.torgaid.com/online-pdrm-assignment.

The assessment criteria varies slightly between two separate cohorts of students.

- For all participants, other than Murdoch students, 100% of the assessment is based on the three assignment questions
- For Murdoch university students:
 - ✓ 90% of the assessment is based on the three assignment questions
 - ✓ 10% of the assessment is based on a combination of engagement in the main Zoom sessions and/or comments in the modified online teaching platform

⁴ There is a degree of flexibility in this, as these may be modified somewhat, according to current humanitarian situations at the time, or by agreement between the facilitator and participants
